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## 1. LA JAPONAISE Sous Les Cerisiers, Paris

At Japanese restaurant/atelier Sous Les Cerisiers, customers can sample chef Sakura Franck's exquisite dishes or learn how to make them. The design by Ralston & Bau is striking and minimalist: clear open space up front gives way to corners bathed in deep blue light, recalling a James Turrell artwork. 2. NATURAL HIGHS
The Upper House, Hong Kong

The Anglo-Chinese hotel company behind the super-luxe Opposite House in Beijing (W\*123) has done it again - this time, getting us hot under the collar in a Hong Kong skyscraper. Set in the Pacific Place retail and commercial centre, The Upper House was envisaged by Hong Kong design stalwart Andre Fu as an inner-city bolt-hole. British designer Thomas Heatherwick is responsible for the simple Bedonia stone portico, which sets an impressive tone. In the public spaces, limestone and bleached oak dominate, and a bamboo 'lantern' installation curves languidly up the escalator. All 117 rooms are at least 70 sq m and Fu has generated an airy aesthetic with natural timbers, shoji glass, lacquered paper panels and green tea- and lilac-coloured upholstery. But there is a reason to leave the haven of the bedroom. Offering views of Victoria Harbour and featuring a 14m-long open kitchen, Café Gray Deluxe marks the return of chef Gray Kunz to the city. ## 3. FRESH TO THE MARKET Louis Hotel, Munich

Like Kull & Weinzierl's previous Cortiina Hotel, Louis Hotel hits a design sweet spot with its 'austerity chic' - courtesy of architects Hild und K. Its central location is bang on, too: overlooking the historic Viktualien fruit and veg market. Leather, brass, oiled-oak parquet and limestone (for the heated bathroom floors) are materials set to develop a patina and age with the hotel. Guestroom furnishings include a nifty, grey

linen-covered travel trunk; standing vertically, it opens to reveal a TV, safe and minibar. As well as the latter, most rooms also have a Gentleman's Bar; the turndown service delivers oranges, lemons and ice and guests can mix their own cocktail before heading to Emiko restaurant and bar for sushi and sashimi platters.
